The final activity undertaken as part of the Social Care module was to help out at local charity shops in Dun Laoghaire and Blackrock. While helping out at these shops we sorted donations and helped customers. Each of the placements was a very rewarding experience and one that will stay with us for years to come.

### Clonkeen Literacy Initiative

#### **'Reading for Pleasure'**

This is a programme established to help foster a love and appreciation for literature. It is aimed primarily at all students in 1<sup>st</sup> Year. The aim is to increase the frequency with which students choose to read. Clonkeen College has purchased a collection of books. All the books in the collection have been sourced and approved by the children's book buyer in Dubray bookshop.

Students will receive a book pack. This pack will contain the book, a student log, the book list, and a section for student review. It is essential that all students sign the student logbook with

the title of their chosen book their own name and the date when they first selected it to read. Students are required to complete a short review of each book they read, which it is hoped will improve their written literacy.

Clonkeen College will allocate 10 minutes of reading time on Monday, Wednesday and Friday in order to promote the initiative and to create a positive environment for reading. It is hoped that students will choose to read in their own personal time at home. The students will have an opportunity to exchange books on Friday morning. Discussing the books they have read with each other as they swap and exchange them, will help to develop their oral literacy.

Finian O'Shea cut the ribbon on Saturday April 17<sup>th</sup> for the new and exciting National Awards. This has been set up to help grow a reading culture in schools. School communities can show how much they value reading by applying for the PDST 'Wellread National Award' which recognises and celebrates their commitment to reading. Students spent the morning at the National Museum in Kildare St. During our visit we viewed beautiful artefacts from the Bronze Age, the Early Christian Period, Ancient Egypt and the Battle of Clontarf while also visiting the "Kingship and Sacrifice" Exhibition where we saw the remains of bodies found preserved in Irish bogs.



The afternoon was spent in the company of Sophie, our tour guide in the National Gallery. Sophie began the tour with an early Renaissance painting which depicted the Annunciation. Other paintings on the tour included the outstanding painting by Caravaggio 'The Taking of Christ'. We were shown a still life from Picasso's Cubist period and a melancholy painting by Yeats of a gambling man who had lost his fiancé. There were a few paintings from the Impressionist era which focus on capturing the fall of light on the chosen subject matter.

The paintings shown to us are part of the Heritage Collection and the guide explained the way in which the gallery hangs paintings and how it chooses to display the work. The walls are painted in subdued colours to compliment the work, and the lighting is soft so as not to damage the paintings. Students were required to complete a worksheet during the guide and two sketches of their chosen works of art.

It was a pleasant and informative day full of culture and art. We are very appreciative to Ms. O'Rourke for accompanying us on the trip and thank you to Manos for the safe journey.

Thanks to Conor Spain in 5<sup>th</sup> year, who earlier this year won a subsidised class trip to Strasbourg from the European Parliament Information Office with his six word message to our MEPs: "11 parliamentary seats, make them count.", 24 students from both 5<sup>th</sup> Year and Transition Year were chosen to travel to the European Parliament in Strasbourg in March, also taking in the German cities of Frankfurt and Heidelberg on their travels.



The trip began on St. Patrick's Day when the students arrived in Frankfurt. First, the group went on a walking tour of the city taking in Europe's financial centre as well as the historic centre which has largely been reconstructed since World War II. After arriving at our accommodation in Strasbourg, we finished off the day with a competitive game of bowling.

The second day began early in the morning with a walking tour of the city of Strasbourg. The visit to the Cathedral of Notre Dame will never be forgotten. We walked up to the very top of the cathedral and the view of the landscape of the city was breath-taking. A cruise on the river Rhine capped off the day's sightseeing which we followed with a trip to the cinema to unwind.

We spent the third and most important day of the trip in the European Parliament in Strasbourg debating issues affecting Europe with over 700 students of our own age from across the European Union. Upon arrival at the parliament after our security check, we were divided up into six committees, each debating a different topic such as the future of Europe and freedom of information. Once each of the committees had agreed on a proposal to put to the wider group, we all joined together in the parliamentary chamber of the European Parliament to debate our proposals.



At the beginning of the parliamentary session, a representative from each country had to introduce their school and their country to the 700+ delegates present. Conor Spain addressed the chamber on our behalf and did the school and country very proud with his presentation as Gaeilge and as Béarla. The parliamentary session itself was a great success. We gave our feedback on many European issues and integrated well with our European counterparts. Sitting in the parliamentary seats our MEPs sit in was a real privilege which we will never forget.

On Day Four of our trip, everyone was sad to leave but it was time to go on the last tour of the trip to the medieval German city of Heidelberg. It started off with a funicular train up to and a guide of Heidelberg Castle. The castle consisted of many rooms, a huge wine cellar downstairs and a wide open courtyard. The views were indescribable. It was then time to leave and say farewell to the city of Heidelberg.



All in all, we had a great action-packed four days and learned much about the inner workings of the European Union as well as the region and its history. Thanks again to Conor Spain in 5th Year for making the trip a possibility.
