D3 Visit to Central Criminal Courts

On Wednesday 7th October, D3 visited the Central Criminal Courts. We were met by a guide and a barrister (Kate) and brought to an empty courtroom where the students took part in a mock trial. Prior to the trip, the students had been given their roles: the accused, the judge, the barristers, the registrar, the jury, the witnesses and even the sketch-artist! The barrister invited them to take their positions in the appropriate seats.

As the mock trial, involving the prosecution of a man for public order offences at a football match, got underway, Kate gave the boys advice on questions they should ask or evidence they should give. The experience was most interesting for all involved and gave the students plenty of food for thought and an insight into potential careers in the justice system.

After the mock trial, Kate kindly provided us with a list of courtrooms where there were real cases in progress. We visited different courtrooms in small groups. Again, this was an eye-opener for the boys. We were just in time to see a jury being sworn in for a case that involved a scientific company being accused of the illegal dumping of hazardous waste. We also saw the Superintendent of Terenure Garda Station presenting 22 books of evidence to the judge. The students took note of how the various court officials operated in their various roles and the dress code within the courtroom. Afterwards, all agreed that it had been a most worthwhile and interesting experience. Thanks to Ms. Gibson and Mags who accompanied the students on the day.

AXA Roadsafe Roadshow

All our Transition Year students visited the AXA Roadsafe Roadshow in Dun Laoghaire on 12th October. Members of An Garda Síochána, Firefighters, Paramedics and an A&E Consultant were among those who spoke to the students about their work, giving insight into the consequences of road accidents. The aim of the programme is to educate young drivers or young future drivers with the hope that they will be mindful road users in the years to come. A very informative afternoon was had by all.



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TY Tour to Berlin

Transition Year students returned from a fantastic trip to Berlin on Monday 2nd November. The students spent five days in the city, taking in some of the culture that this incredible city has to offer. On Day 1, we started our trip at 4:30 a.m., meeting in Dublin Airport for our flight to Berlin. Arriving in Berlin later that morning we checked into our hostel before setting out for Hackesher Market for a three hour walking tour of the city.



Berlin truly is a kaleidoscope of modern and historical architecture, old buildings standing proud among, what can only be described as a large building site. We were reminded that much of the city remained in the communist East Germany until the fall of the Berlin Wall in 1989 and so the rebuilding of some areas devastated during the Second World War has only been undertaken in recent years. The boys got to see the sights of Berlin including Reichstag, the Holocaust Memorial, part of the Berlin Wall and the Brandenburg Gate to name just a few. It was an experience of note for the students to see the history of the city still etched on the buildings, in the bullet holes from World War II.

The following day we went to Sachsenhausen Concentration Camp Memorial. This was one of the highlights of the trip. The two guides we had were excellent. Both teachers and students were enthralled by this unique tour. We were told that this was not a history lesson, it was a memorial of emotion, of anguish and hurt but, most importantly, a memorial to hope and determination. The visit certainly bore this out.

Our third day in Berlin started with two and a half hours of exhilarating fun. Mount Mitte is a climbing centre that both terrifies and excites in equal measure. The bravery of some of our students and staff (Mr Bennett) was called into question but most dared to test themselves on even the highest levels. That evening we got to go to the Olympic Stadium, surely one of the finest in Europe, to watch Hertha Berlin play Borrusia Mönchengladbach. Although the hosts ended up losing 4-1 the atmosphere was nothing short of electric for the entire 90 minutes.



Sunday was a day of leisure activities at Tropical Island. Tropical Island is a tropical waterpark located in the former CargoLifter hangar, the biggest freestanding hall in the world. We spent seven hours swimming, shooting down water slides, playing mini-golf, enjoying the Mediterranean climate that this indoor paradise provides.



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It was with heavy hearts that we awoke on Monday knowing it was our last day in this wonderful city. It was not wasted though. We started with a visit to Checkpoint Charlie before making our way to The Mall of Berlin where the students did some last minute shopping. It was here that we stumbled across a German TV station recording some material for its Christmas schedule. It took very little coaxing to get the group to participate, humming and singing along to one of the year's hits. While it was not a performance worthy of the X Factor, all agreed that the boys did us proud.



As we returned a group of weary boys to their parents that night we reflected on what an enjoyable experience the tour had been for all. The students were, as Clonkeen students always are, a credit to both the school and their community. We were told on more than one occasion, and at the Sachsenhausen Memorial in particular, that the students' behaviour was second to none, and we feel we must echo this praise. A special thanks to all teachers involved (Mr. Faherty, Mr. O' Shaughnessy, Mr. Bennett, Ms. Ní Chatháin and Ms. Fulton) for giving up their midterm break to accompany the group.
