The good news continued when we learned that our colleague, Ms Máire Duffy, had been chosen to receive the prestigious Physics Teacher of the Year Award. We showed our strength in many of our sporting endeavours this year, with a special note going to our 1st Years who shone in both Futsal and

Spikeball. We also achieved successes in Hurling, Soccer, Rugby and Tennis. The high point of our sporting year, however, was our U18 Gaelic Football Team becoming Senior Dublin 'B' Division Champions. Students from Clonkeen College brought glory to the school as they were recognised for their entrepreneurship, with ROC Protection bringing home both the Griffith College Enterprise Award 2017 and the Senior Student Enterprise Award 2017.

It was a year in which we promoted mental wellbeing. Events and initiatives ran across the school year, with students engaging in reflective practice, art therapy and learning techniques to mind their mental health.



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Guest speakers ran workshops on topics ranging from internet safety through to the connection between mental wellbeing and substance usage. I am delighted that the fantastic work of our SPHE teachers, Health Promotions Team and Anti-Bullying Ambassadors has been recognised by the awarding of the Health Promotions Flag to Clonkeen College.



Following two years of fundraising, in November 2016, Clonkeen College Third World Support Group (TWSG) was delighted to open a new school in Assam, India. Having completed one successful school build, the group signed a contract, in January 2017, with Action Aid to build a new eight-classroom school in Malawi, at a cost of €40,000. We plan to build this over two years.

Fundraising for this new venture continues apace. We would like to express our thanks to the parishioners of Foxrock Parish who very generously donated €4,281.45 in a church gate collection. We were able to add to this figure when Bank of Ireland donated €1,250, through their Give Together Fund. Our final non-uniform day of this academic year took place in April, raising a further €825 and the annual TWSG concert, on May 25<sup>th</sup> added €425. We would like to thank Mr McGloughlin and his musicians for putting together a wonderful show and the students and families of Clonkeen College for their continued support.

As the year draws to a close we would like to express our sincere gratitude to everyone who has supported our work so generously over the last year. As the group goes forward into its twenty-fourth year, we know that with your support we can achieve even greater things for the poorest of the poor.

#### Gaisce Hike
