

There have been exciting building project developments during the summer holidays of 2016. The existing school has had most of its refurbishment works completed. It is with great sadness that we bring news of the death of Brother John Loftus, who passed away at the end of August. Brother Loftus chose to leave teaching in advance of the usual retirement age in order to pursue training in addiction counselling. # Design Communication Graphics (DCG)

TY students are the first students in Clonkeen College to study Design Communication Graphics (DCG). This technological subject is taught by Mr Benson.

At junior cycle DCG is known as Technical Graphics (TG). Both TG and DCG develop problem solving, spatial visualisation and creative thinking skills by analysing and solving problems in two and three dimensional graphics. DCG employs a variety of media including computer-aided design using the SolidWorks programme.

TY students are currently being introduced to technical drawing skills while studying areas such as freehand sketching, perspective projection and 3D modelling in SolidWorks. It is hoped that the school may be in a position to offer TG at junior cycle and DCG at senior cycle for the 2017/2018 academic year.

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## 1<sup>st</sup> Year Buddies

During the first week of the new term, the Clonkeen Buddy programme was introduced. Each 1<sup>st</sup> Year student had the opportunity to meet their TY Buddy for the first time during a 1<sup>st</sup> Year PE class, where the groups took part in team building exercises. Not only did the 1<sup>st</sup> Years get to know their new buddies but the activity also helped 1<sup>st</sup> Years to get to know each other. It is hoped that this initiative will aid their transition from primary school to secondary school.



#### First Aid

Transition Year students in D3 took part in a First Aid course delivered by the Red Cross on September 8<sup>th</sup> and 15<sup>th</sup>. During the two-day course, students worked towards a qualification in Practical First Aid (PFA). The course covered many different situations in which students might find themselves and took them through many practical skills from making slings, to how to treat shock and carry out effective CPR.



The students were also educated in primary and secondary assessment of a scene; learning the importance of simple actions such as talking to a person in distress or taking note of time and changes in the condition of the patient.

## Manchester United Trip

The annual Manchester United trip for 2<sup>nd</sup> Year students took place the weekend of 9<sup>th</sup>/10<sup>th</sup> September this year. The students had the good fortune to attend one of the most anticipated matches of the Premier League season – the Manchester Derby.

The group of 56 students and 5 teachers departed from the school at 6:15 a.m. on Friday morning, boarding the coach for Dublin Port to catch the ferry to Holyhead. The long drive to Manchester was no hardship for the boys as everyone was in high spirits. The first order of business was the tour of Old Trafford, the famous stadium known as "The Theatre of Dreams". The tour was followed by a trip to the Trafford Centre for dinner and shopping.



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Saturday began with a lovely breakfast in Ashton, before the group went across town for a tour of the Etihad Stadium, Manchester City's home ground. This was a highlight for Shane Russell and Eoin Doyle - the two lone City fans on the trip. After that, the boys went back across to Old Trafford in time to soak up the pre-match atmosphere before the 12:30 kick-off. The match was a real cracker, the atmosphere was incredible, as is expected at a Derby match. City won 2-1 after a gripping game that was unpredictable right until the final whistle.



The game was followed by a trip to the Imperial War Museum, and then a walk through Media City in Salford on what was a beautiful evening. Then there was a final return to the Trafford Centre for shopping and a bite to eat.

The journey home began on Sunday morning with the boys still buzzing after their fantastic day. On the way back to Holyhead they stopped in Llanfair-pwllgwyngyllgogerychwyrndrobwllllantysiliogogog och, the village with the longest name in Wales. The trip home on the boat was lovely, with many of the boys watching Tarzan in the cinema on board the ship.

#### TWSG Uganda Trip

Although it is a much overused cliché, it is only fair to describe the Third World Support Group (TWSG) trip to Uganda, as a life-changing experience. After years of contributing to the group through fundraising and helping to organise events, it was a huge achievement when Klent Nervez (6<sup>th</sup> Year) and I were selected to go on the June 2016 trip to Uganda. Over the course of the last two years, Clonkeen College TWSG has invested €20,000 in an agriculture project in two villages near Gulu, in northern Uganda. During our stay in Uganda we visited the project site and saw for ourselves the positive impact that it has had on the lives of the local people.

On our arrival at the village, we were greeted by women in bright dresses singing and clapping for us in their native language. After speeches, there

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was an exchange of gifts where we received a beautiful African harp, a carved wooden figurine, a stuffed otter and two live chickens! Hearing first-hand how the villagers' lives have been improved gave us tremendous insight into how the money we raise during long hours collecting small donations and bag-packing makes such a difference to people's lives.



Travelling through Uganda, we saw native animals, birds and insects. Our knowledge of the country's landscape and wildlife was greatly enhanced during a visit to a wildlife park. We were also lucky enough to hike up Murchison Falls and to visit the Equator and the source of the Nile.



Everything about the country, the huge economic divides, beautiful scenery and friendly people was an experience completely different to any ideas Klent and I had had about the region before the trip. Coming from a rich country like Ireland, it was a huge eye-opener for us. Most importantly the visit really strengthened our belief that the work we do, as part of the TSWG, makes a difference to the communities with whom we work.

### **Debating Society News**

September was a very busy for the Clonkeen Debating Society, which yielded great success across the board. The first round of the Matheson Junior Debating National Mace took place on September 17<sup>th</sup> in Coláiste na hInse, Bettystown. Clonkeen College was represented by two teams. The first was the experienced combination of Ayman Memon (2<sup>nd</sup> Year) and David Farrelly (3<sup>rd</sup> Year), who performed admirably, securing a top-ten placing. The second team was made up of 1<sup>st</sup> Years Bhudhav Singh and Sam Newcombe, who on their debut, spoke confidently and with ease. We expect great things from these two new debaters in the years ahead!

The senior debaters also had their first competitions of the new school year in September. Killian Farrelly (5<sup>th</sup> Year) and Finn McGrath (TY) entered the International Competition for Young Debaters qualification round. They did extraordinarily well, making the final round in which they finished in second place. This secured their place in the finals of the prestigious competition which will be hosted by The Cambridge Union on April 29<sup>th</sup> 2017.

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Finally, the senior Leinster Schools Debating Competition hosted by Trinity College kicked off on September 27<sup>th</sup>, with two teams of TY students representing Clonkeen College – Mark Brophy and Ruairi Greene, and Sean Nolan and Lucas Carragher. Both teams did very well in what is a highly competitive competition, with the best debaters from across Leinster all taking part.
