## DUBLIN 'B' CHAMPS 2017!



Our Senior Football Team, managed by Mr Sheehy and Mr McBride, played their **Dublin Schools Senior 'B' Championship Final** against **Malahide Community School** on March 9<sup>th</sup>. Given that this was our first year at 'B' level it was a huge achievement to reach the final of the competition.

We opened the game, getting the first point on the scoreboard. Malahide keen to make their mark on the game, responded immediately. The first half continued in much the same way with score after score being matched by the opposition. Our boys maintained their composure and played for each ball, earning themselves a slight advantage going into the break.

The second half was an incredibly tense affair, with neither side managing to build a muchdesired lead. Malahide looked like they might just manage this feat when they put a goal between themselves and Clonkeen. However, with eight minutes left on the clock, Cormac Quinn slotted the ball past the Malahide keeper, drawing the sides level once more. With the two sides engaging in a point for point battle once more, it appeared that extra time would be a certainty. However, man of the match, Cormac Quinn, had other ideas and his final-minute point saw our boys take home the title on a score line of 1-12 to 1-11.

The next challenge for the team was their **Leinster Final** encounter, played on March 23<sup>rd</sup> against **St Mary's CBS, Carlow**. Again, Clonkeen got the first score on the board. St Mary's replied and asserted themselves on the field, maintaining their lead for the duration of the opening half.

Our boys returned to the pitch after their halftime team talk with a renewed sense of purpose and a dogged determination to make their mark on the game. They slowly built their tally but remained a goal adrift going into the dying minutes



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of the game. It looked like all was lost for Clonkeen, until Jim Kennedy scored a muchneeded goal, forcing the game into extra time.

Taking an early lead in extra time, St Mary's, built a sizeable margin. Despite their hard work and persistence Clonkeen were shut out at every opportunity. Unfortunately, when the final whistle blew Clonkeen were again denied a Leinster title as St Mary's were crowned winners. The score: 2-14 to 1-9.

Although they were disappointed to have been denied a Leinster title for the second consecutive year, the team and their coaches, Mr Sheehy and Mr McBride, must be congratulated on their outstanding performance in this year's competition. We look forward to seeing them in action next year!

#### Transition Year Work Experience Diary

I carried out a week of my work experience at Shankill Garda Station, where they run a weeklong work experience placement for Transition Year students, several times each year. This was a very interesting and worthwhile experience.

On my first day, Monday, we stayed at the station and were introduced to a man who was part of the Public Order Unit. He showed us his riot gear and equipment and spoke to us about some of his experiences during riots and his training to become a member of the Public Order Unit. We saw the equipment and uniforms of the operational Gardaí such as their new ASP batons and their pepper spray.

The next day we met members of the forensic team and learned about the many areas of forensics. They spoke about the different situations that may result in the forensic team being called to a crime scene. We were taught how to take fingerprints from a crime scene and practised on the windows. The forensic team spoke to us about the different tasks they carry out to find evidence and identify people. One detective explained about the different ways of tracking people and talked about a murder that he had been investigating.



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#### My time with the Gardaí was a unique experience. I enjoyed seeing aspects of the job and visiting places that I would not usually have access to. It was a really wonderful opportunity to get an idea of what it would be like to be a member of An Garda Síochána.

#### Transition Year Ski Trip

Early on the morning of February 22<sup>nd</sup>, a group of twenty-five sleep-deprived Transition Year students met at Dublin Airport to fly to Italy for Clonkeen College's first ever ski trip. Once goodbyes were said and luggage checked in, the boys and their teachers, Mr Faherty, Mr O'Shaughnessy and Mr Brennan, passed through security and onwards to their flight to Milan. A little over two hours and a cat nap later the group got their first view of the snow-capped mountains as their plane began its descent. Excitement filled the air!

The group made a short stop at the restaurant opposite the airport before boarding their coach for the three-and-a-half-hour journey to Lavarone. Once at the resort, rooms were organised and then it was off to the ski rental shop to get everyone kitted out for the week ahead.

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We left the station for the first time on Wednesday when we visited the Criminal Courts of Justice. We learned about what happens in a courtroom and witnessed some live trials. A tour of the holding cells followed, after which we boarded the prison bus to see how prisoners are transported. The highlight of the day was when we went to a murder trial and saw a witness take the stand to give their account of what had happened. It was a truly unique experience, which was made even more memorable by the fact that I was sitting next to the father of the accused, who struck up a conversation with me during one of the breaks.

We started early on Thursday morning, when we were brought to Templemore to see the Garda Training College. We spent a very interesting day at Templemore, with two trainee Gardaí, learning about the strict rules they must observe, their training programme and visiting their facilities and living space. The two trainees also spoke to us about the history of the college and showed us some old uniforms and weapons.

On my final day at Shankill Garda Station, we spent the morning with a Garda who worked in The Traffic Corps. He gave some harrowing accounts of road accidents that he had seen and told us that many of these accidents had been avoidable, having been the result of drunk driving or texting while driving. Later that day, we met two detectives who work in the Drugs Unit. They told us about the different drugs on the Irish market, showing us some specimens in sealed bags, before describing some drug busts in which they had been involved.





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Having thoroughly enjoyed their week's skiing the boys and the three teachers, arrived back home late in the evening of 28<sup>th</sup> February. A big thankyou must go, of course, to the three teachers who organised the trip and accompanied the boys. Mr Faherty, Mr O'Shaughnessy and Mr Brennan would also like to commend the boys on their excellent behaviour throughout the trip.

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The next morning ski school beckoned for all. Groups were organised, instructors were introduced and soon everyone was ready to hit the slopes. After two hours of gruelling ski instruction it was time to give tired muscles a rest and gather for lunch. Over lunch stories of ski school were exchanged and plans made for an afternoon on the slopes. During the afternoon, the boys had the opportunity to explore the area in smaller groups. For one, however, this was to be the end of his action on the slopes. Unfortunately, Seán Hussey, earned himself and Mr Brennan a trip to Accident and Emergency in Trento, as he, in his own words, "fell over", resulting in a fractured collar bone.



While the remaining days played out in a similar fashion to the first, with lessons in the morning followed by free-ski in the afternoon, Seán gallantly manned the walkie-talkies at base, staying in touch with the groups on the various slopes. The boys spent the evenings playing cards or organising table quizzes. A highlight of the trip for all involved was Tubing on the Friday night, while "meal of-the-week" was declared following a visit to a nearby pizzeria on the boys' last night in Lavarone.

#### Young Social Innovators (YSI)

The Transition Year Young Social Innovators (YSI) class participated in the regional YSI showcase that took place on Tuesday 21<sup>st</sup> March at the RDS.

The first group to take to the stage spoke about their initiative entitled "The Journey to Health". The group was led by Sam Quinn. Guy Keogh spoke about the benefits of a healthy lifestyle while Darragh Cunningham explained why the group had chosen this project. Adam Whelan completed the team's showcase, delivering a rap on the subject of healthy eating.





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## The school is located in the Thordolo district in the south-east of the Country. The building of the school will be broken down in to two phases.

The first phase, which will be completed this year, involves the renovation of two blocks of four class-rooms at a cost of  $\leq 16,809.30$  and the construction of two blocks of toilets for boys and girls costing  $\leq 2,490.27$ .

The second phase will get underway in 2018 and will see the construction of a block of two class-rooms, costing  $\pounds 12,451.30$ . At this point, two teacher houses will be built at a cost of  $\pounds 8,715.94$ .

In total this project will cost €40,661.81 to complete. As always, the group appeals for the support of the whole school community to make this school become a reality. This was the second time the teams had faced each other this year. Unfortunately, Clonkeen had lost the first encounter. Calling back TYs from Work Experience, our coaches were able to field their preferred starting fifteen, all of whom were seeking revenge for the defeat they'd suffered earlier in the season.

Clonkeen started well with early points from the full forward line. Halfway through the first half Colmcille's were gifted two goals from errors in the Clonkeen defence. The Clonkeen side, regained their composure to ensure that they remained in touch through the remainder of the first half. A notable mention goes to Macdara O Midheach (0-4) who scored some fantastic long range points. Colmcille's ended the first half in the lead with a score of 2-4 to 0-7.
