

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
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#### Mobile Planetarium

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
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Anthology 2018

### Live in HD from Clonkeen

Many of you may have attended the Live in HD broadcasts in cinemas of opera matinees from New York's Metropolitan Opera House. But did you know there was a Clonkeen connection?



Robert Young, a past student of the college, and his American wife Julie Borchard are joint founders of BY Experience. This independent company is the leading global distributor of alternative content and events to cinema screens. It offers cultural, entertainment and educational producers the opportunity to reach audiences in an innovative, communal manner through satellite distribution of live high-definition digital events to over 3,000 cinemas and performing arts centres in more than 75 countries.

It was Robert and Julie who first suggested to the



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Metropolitan Opera board that it should augment its weekly radio broadcasts of Saturday matinees, on air since the 1930s, with live telecasts into cinemas. Since its formation in 2003, BY Experience has distributed over 250 unique events to cinema audiences globally, including the three leading series in cinemas, The Met: Live in HD (from 2005 to the present), National Theatre Live (ex-UK, from 2009 to the present), Bolshoi Ballet in Cinema (from 2014 to the present). Millions of tickets have been sold to date.

Robert and Julie live in central New York with their three children. Robert keeps in regular touch with the college and we are delighted he will be attending our upcoming Gala Dinner.
