We will forever be indebted to this brave group of people who initiated legal proceedings and put the needs of current and future pupils of Clonkeen to the fore, understanding the devastating impact that the loss of such a huge portion of our playing field would have on daily life here at Clonkeen College.



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Science on Stage Festival



We were delighted to have Ms Máire Duffy represent both Clonkeen College and Ireland at the Science on Stage Festival in Debrecen, Hungary. She was a member of an eight-strong team from Ireland who took part in this year's event. They joined hundreds of other STEM teachers from across Europe at the festival, which takes place every two years. The festival provides STEM teachers from across Europe with the opportunity to exchange ideas and experiences. Ms Duffy presented her project "Homemade Electroscopes".

Congratulations to Declan Cathcart and Robert Clarke, two members of the Irish team whose projects were highly commended. The team had a great experience and took home many interesting ideas. Ms Duffy and the rest of the team then presented their own experiments and

others from the festival at the Frontiers of Physics conference in University of Limerick in September. They will do so again at the Irish Science Teachers' conference in March.



Higher Options

All 6th Year students, accompanied by Mr O'Hora, attended the Higher Options Exhibition at the RDS on Friday 15th September. The students had an opportunity to find out about different paths of study open to them, in addition to other further education and training programmes. It gave all students lots to think about as they consider their future paths.

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Junior Cycle Award

With the new academic year, new Junior Cycle subject specifications are being rolled out in Irish, French and Art. These join those already underway in English, Science and Business Studies. Additionally, this year sees the start of the Wellbeing aspect of the Junior Cycle. For students in Clonkeen, this has meant an increase in the amount of time allocated to Social, Personal and Health Education (SPHE) and the maintenance of our Physical Education (PE) and Civic Social and Political Education (CSPE) hours.

We are fully embracing the new Junior Cycle Framework in Clonkeen. Classroom Based Assessments (CBA) will take place later in the academic year in English for our current 3rd Year students and in English, Business and Science for our current 2nd students. Staff will undergo further Continuing Professional Development (CPD) later in the year which will, unfortunately, necessitate a small number of school closures. Parents and guardians will be notified directly of any planned closure as soon as we have been issued with the dates.

Transition Year Musical

This year our Transition Year students will be putting on a performance of the musical *Bugsy Malone*. The musical is a gangster comedy loosely based around the exploits of gangs in Chicago and New York during Prohibition in the 1920s.

The group has been participating in music and drama classes and have learned some of the main songs like "We could Have Been Anything That We Wanted To Be" and "So You Want To Be A Boxer". They have learned some of the basics of acting, things like expressing emotion clearly through tone of voice and body language. In addition to this, the students have been taking inspiration from the 1976 film version.

Auditions took place on Monday, 15th September and all roles have now been filled. The titular character, Bugsy, will be played by Nathan Tormey, while Andrew Byrne will support him in the role of Fat Sam. We will keep you up-to-date with the latest news from rehearsals and hope to see you all in attendance on opening night!

Home Economics teaches students not only what's in the food we eat every day; but also, how to plan and cook nutritious and economical meals; how to choose the best food for themselves and their family; the importance of good nutrition and health; and the role of the consumer in modern eating patterns.


Home Economics develops the knowledge, understanding, skills and values necessary achieve optimal, healthy and sustainable living for every person as an individual, and as a member of families
